1. **WELCOME**

President Lacy welcomed everyone to the meeting. Roll call was taken by the Secretariat.

2. **NATIONAL CRIMINAL INFORMATION CENTER**

At the 2006 Annual Meeting, AJCA members requested that information on the National Criminal Information Center (NCIC) be provided at the Mid-Year Meeting. Dawne Gannon introduced Tony Nelson, Supervisor, South Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice, who graciously agreed to provide this training. Mr. Nelson explained that NCIC is a computerized data base of documented criminal justice information available to virtually every law enforcement agency nationwide, twenty-four hours a day, 365 days per year. NCIC became operational in 1967 with the goal of assisting law enforcement in apprehending fugitives and locating stolen property. This goal has since expanded to include locating missing persons and further protecting law enforcement and the public. NCIC handles almost two million transactions per day.

Mr. Nelson explained that the NCIC computer is currently housed at FBI Headquarters in Clarksburg, West Virginia. Connecting terminals are located throughout the United States, Canada, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands in police departments, sheriff's offices, state agencies and other criminal justice agencies. During a one-year period alone, 39,268 missing juveniles were found.

The NCIC data base consists of 18 files (seven property files and eleven person files). Mr. Nelson reviewed each piece of information that is collected by NCIC in its "person files" and encouraged ICJ staff to provide accurate information to the terminal operator when entering juvenile information and to be timely in entering, removing or updating information as soon as possible. Completeness of an entry is also important so that the record to be disseminated is comprised of all the pertinent information available.

President Lacy thanked Mr. Nelson for providing this NCIC training.

3. CLOSING REMARKS

President Lacy thanked members for their participation in the Mid-Year Meeting and noted that the input of all members is important to the successfulness of the compact. He, again, thanked Dawne Gannon of the South Carolina ICJ office for hosting the meeting. The hotel site is beautiful and Dawne has worked very hard to make sure that everything went smoothly.

Mr. Lacy remarked that the next several months will be very important in that it is highly likely that the new compact will be enacted by the end of the Spring. However, the Board will continue to plan for the Annual Meeting in August in Lexington, Kentucky.

Cynthia Yim was asked to offer a benediction. The Mid-Year Meeting was then adjourned.
